

Can I change my mind?

Taking part in a research study is entirely voluntary. If you sign up and later decide you do not want to continue, simply tell your study doctor.

What are clinical research studies?

Clinical research studies are done to better understand the safety of an investigational therapy or medications and how it works in the body. Qualified doctors run clinical trials. They are responsible for the study-related care of the people who join.

What if I have questions?

If you have questions about the study or your therapy at any time during the study, ask your doctor.

Alzheimer's Disease Study

What Is AMBAR?

AMBAR is a research study that looks at the use of albumin as a treatment for Alzheimer's disease. Albumin is a naturally-occurring protein found in blood plasma that serves many functions. The AMBAR study will use plasma exchange to separate and remove plasma from blood. Albumin will replace the plasma that is removed.

The AMBAR study will include 364 patients at medical centers in Spain and the United States. Patients who qualify to participate in the study will receive study-related exams and study therapy at no cost to them.

Who can take part in AMBAR?

You may be eligible to join AMBAR if you:

- Are between 55 and 85 years old
- Have been diagnosed with mild-to-moderate Alzheimer's disease
- Have received regular medication with acetylcholine esterase inhibitors for the past three months
- Have an available and reliable caregiver

If you are interested in learning more about whether or not you qualify for AMBAR, talk to your study doctor. He or she can go over all of the requirements for study participation.

What is the role of the caregiver in AMBAR?

The caregiver (or family member) plays an important role in the study. For the AMBAR study, the caregiver (or family member) is an active participant. Caregivers must:

- Attend all study visits with the enrolled patient
- Complete study questionnaires during study visits
- Tell the study doctor about any changes the patient may experience while participating in the treatment



Why participate in AMBAR?

There is no cure for Alzheimer's disease. Research is being done to better understand the disease and to advance options for its prevention and therapy. By participating in research, you may help make a difference for others with Alzheimer's disease.

If you decide to join AMBAR, you will see a doctor regularly. You will also receive important information about how Alzheimer's disease is affecting your brain.

What is an Informed Consent Form (ICF)?

Informed Consent is your agreement to join the study and is required before you enroll in AMBAR. A member of the Study Team will give you the Informed Consent Form (ICF), which describes the study, the risks, and the benefits. You should review the ICF together with your study doctor and caregiver. If you have any questions, please ask the Study Team. By signing the ICF, you agree to participate in the study.
